Photography Contest Held

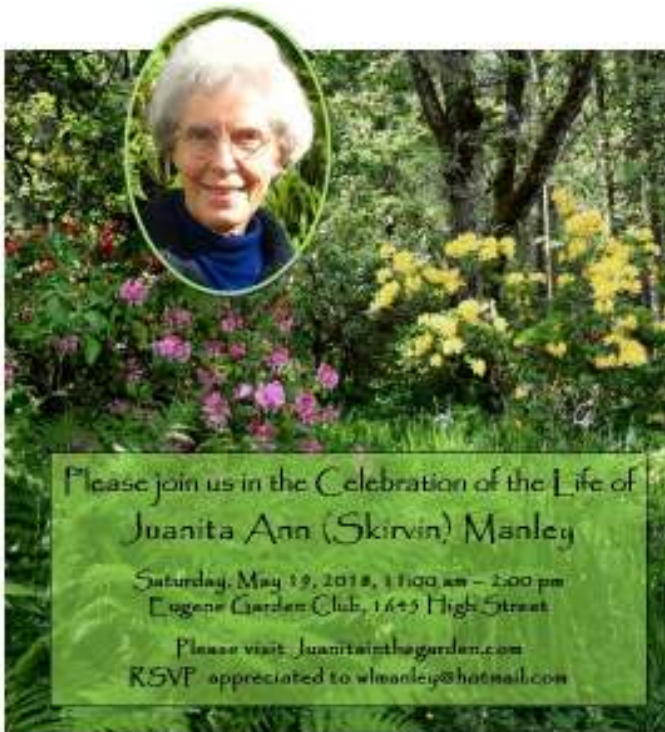
Bring your entries for the **State Photography Contest** to this month's EGC meeting by 9:30 a.m. and our members will vote for their favorites in the following categories:

Now is the time to divide those plants to share with others AND make some money for the Garden Club. This year we are relying on YOU to pot-up your own plants that you want to share.

Later this month there will be planting soil and gallon pots available at the clubhouse and perhaps at Janet Calvert's home. Check your emails.

At the Membership meeting on March 20, sign up to let us know if you want soil.

Divide your plants (no more than 5 of one variety) and pot them with the pot full and looking like you would like to buy it in six weeks.

Place plants in protected area and keep watered.

Cheetah

Acinonyx jubatus

Recently my husband Greg & I made a visit to the Wildlife Safari in Winston. We hadn't been there for over ten years. It is showing its age a bit, but we enjoyed our leisurely drive through the park and were delighted to see many animals out, even with the cooler temperatures.

One of our favorite animals to see is the Cheetah. They are a sleek, beautiful cat. They are a true muscle machine. They can run in bursts of 68 - 75 mph.

Did you know that cheetahs have poor night vision and cannot climb trees? They do, however, have excellent eyesight that helps them find prey during the day. They are hard to spot because their coat blends well with the tall, dry grass of the plains. Suddenly, the cheetah makes a lightning quick dash. It knocks its prey to the ground, then bites it in the throat.

Once often found in Asia or Africa, Cheetahs today are racing towards extinction. Loss of habitat and declining numbers of their prey combine to threaten the future of the cats.

Cheetahs live and hunt mainly in open grasslands and bushy areas in parts of Africa and the Middle East. They eat mainly small to medium size animals such as hares, impalas, wildebeest calves and gazelles.

Wildlife Safari has a breeding program for the Cheetah. Through the years they have bred over 200 kittens into the program.

So, the next time you want to experience a little adventure, take the drive to Winston and cruise through the Wildlife Safari.

**Eugene Garden Club
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In the Garden – in March

Plant cool season crops such as peas, lettuce, cabbage, onions, kale & chard.

**Divide hostas, daylilies, mums, peonies, dahlias late in the month.
(Note: If weather is very cold, wait until April for dahlias; wait until you can see the tuber eyes well.)**

Feed rhubarb, cane berries, evergreen shrubs & trees with manure or complete fertilizer.

Plant berry crops (strawberry, raspberry, blueberry, blackberry).

Prune gooseberries & currants and feed with manure or a complete fertilizer.

Move existing rose bushes; plant new ones by the 15th; fertilize with 1 cu. alfalfa meal per bush by end of month.

Spread compost over garden and landscape areas.

Plant gladioli.
