December in the Garden

At this time of year we are inside thinking about Christmas, but with outside temperatures dropping below freezing, many of our plants will be suffering from dehydration which will make them more susceptible to cold temperature damage. Check the soil around plants and water those that have not received rainwater due to protection by overhanging roof or other structures. Make sure that containers are protected from freezing by moving them into garages during freezing temperatures.

Here are a few tips on caring for your Poinsettias: Do not over water. if plant becomes really dry put in sink and fill with water up to top of pot you may also need to water from the top of the pot, Water lightly when the top inch of soil is dry, aim to keep the soil consistently moist. Place poinsettias in a place where they are exposed to indirect sunlight throughout daytime.

Avoid moving the plants to different rooms and different temperatures. Keep room temperatures between approximately 61 and 72 degrees. Keep plants away from cold windows, drafts, and heat sources. Enjoy!

Northern Cardinal Cardinalis

With Christmas approaching, I always think of the Cardinal. It is depicted in winter scenes on Christmas cards and books.

The Cardinal is also known as the redbird, common cardinal or just cardinal. The common name as well as the scientific name refers to the cardinals of the Roman Catholic Church, who wear distinctive red robes and caps.

It can be found in southern Canada, through the eastern U.S. from Maine to Texas and south to Mexico, Belize and Guatemala.

The northern cardinal is a mid-sized songbird. It has a distinctive crest on the head and a mask on the face which is black in the male and gray in the female. The male is vibrant red while the female is a dull reddish olive color. They are mainly granivorous but will eat insects and fruit. The male behaves territorially, marking his territory with song. During the courtship, the male feeds the female, beak to beak.

A clutch of three to four eggs is laid, and two to four clutches are produced each year. Now that is quite a family!

It was once prized as a pet, but its sale as a caged bird was banned in the U.S. by the Migratory Bird Treaty Act of 1918.

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In the Garden - in December

Dig and store geraniums, tuberous begonias, dahlias, and gladioli. (Never store dahlia tubers on a cement floor over winter, but in a cardboard box with newspaper to insulate against freezing. Also turn clumps upside down so moisture drains out of cut stalks.)

It's not too late to plant spring bulbs, but don't delay!

Renew mulch around perennial flower beds after removing weeds.

Take cuttings of rhododendrons and camellias now.

Mulch small fruit trees to protect from winter freezes.

Spread lime on lawns.

Clean and oil tools and equipment before storing for winter.

Place mulch of manure over dormant vegetable garden area. A 3-4" layer of leaves spread over the garden plot prevents soil compaction by rain.
