Spring at the Shelton-McMurphey-Johnson House always finds EGC members planting, weeding, or making some landscape changes. <u>The next work day is Thursday, May 23, 11:00 a.m.</u> Bring your weeding tools and clippers.

Last month, Sherry Cossey, Patty Boynton, Terrye Eames, & Julie Yamane weeded and planted 48 beautiful red geraniums.

This month, Thursday, May 23, we will also need to work on deadheading rhododendrons, caring for the many roses, peonies, and azaleas and perhaps edge the lawn as well as finishing the weeding of the cedar seedlings. All help is appreciated!

We are hoping to get some help from the City or Parks Department to haul off the piles of downed tree and other plant materials from over the years.

LANE COUNTY FAIR COMING UP

The schedules for departments at the Lane County Fair are online now, and the Floral Department Theme is "Fun With Flowers" and follows the Fair therme of "Find Your Fun". The dates for the Fair this year are July 24-28. The Fair books are available now and there will be a few at the clubhouse.

Entries can be made through the Fair website at www.atthefair.com or in person or by mail anytime now through June. Changes or new entries can be made on entry day, July 24.

Our District Garden Club members are again being asked to Host and Hostess for 2-hour shifts during the run. EGC's assigned days are Wednesday and Thursday. I am sure we can also fill in on Sunday. All hosts, demos, display folks, programs, etc. will receive passes for entry into the Fair on the day involved. AND all Still Exhibits, including Floral, will again be in the Performance Hall, with AIR CONDITIONING! Entry and parking will be similar to what we did last year. Enter the building from the south end.

EGC will enter the 6' x 4' Garden we need a few people to plan and produce that. It's set up can be started before entry day.

EGC will also be planting several barrels Monday, June 3, at 1:00, for the Planted Barrel Design Contest. The barrels will have each club's name prominently displayed with the barrels in the Fair in the Food Court areas. Last year we won \$50 for our 1st place. People have signed up to help with that and we thank Coastal Farm & Ranch for donating \$75 worth of plants for us to use in our endeavor.

Horticulture (Cut Flowers and Potted Plants) will include just about anything you have growing in your yard or your house!

The Design classes are organized the same as in the past, by Open, Advanced Amateur, and Novice. Some of the classes include traditional mass, foliage only, all dried material, including some vegetables, using a repurposed old container, featuring wood, featuring metal, all-dried miniature designs (5" or less), and 3 kinds of table designs. The Junior Fair has classes for 0-8, 9-11, 12-14, 15-18, 19-21 years old.

EGC will put on a floral arranging activity for children and seniors again this year - at least 2 days. Plan to sign up for helping with this at our May and June meeting.

Oregon State Insect Oregon Swallowtail

(Papilio Machaon oregonius)

On July 17, 1979 the Oregon Legislative Assembly adopted the Oregon Swallowtail butterfly as Oregon's official state insect to join the beaver, the chinook salmon, the Oregon grape, the Douglas fir, the western meadowlark and the thunder egg, a geode like rock, as unique symbols of Oregon's distinctive history and environment.

The Oregon Swallowtail is a large butterfly with a four inch wing span and the distinctive swallow tail. Its primary colors are yellow and black with a small number of delicate blue spots on the hind wings, and a single orange-red circle centered in the middle of the blue.

Its range is east of the Cascades from southern British Columbia, eastern Washington and Oregon, to Idaho and western Montana. It mostly inhabits the lower sagebrush canyons of the Columbia River and its tributaries. Its host plant is tarragon sagebrush while adults nectar on a wide variety of blooming plants: thistles, rudbeckia, balsamroot, zinnia, milkweed, phlox, wild roses, and *Vicia cracca*, a type of vetch.

For those of us not inclined to venture to the eastern part of our state to see the Oregon Swallowtail we have three swallowtails in Lane County: the Anise, Western, and Pale. All three share the same general coloration as the Oregon Swallowtail.

Threats are essentially the same for all butterflies: loss of habitat, herbicides, pesticides, wasps, birds, and spiders.

Horticulture

Believe it or not it is time to water your gardens. Be sure to check how wet the ground is by digging a small hole down about six inches deep. Over watering can be more of a problem than not enough. Young transplants are very susceptible to hot weather so watch them carefully and water at the first signs of wilting or if ground is getting dry.

It is still pretty cool at night so protection for tomato plants, egg plants and peppers will help keep them warm enough at night. Gallon fruit juice plastic jugs make good covers for small plants. Just cut the bottoms off and take off lids, press jug into ground over the plant.

Seeds for lettuce, radish, cabbage family, carrots and beets will grow well if planted now. If you were able to plant earlier you may be harvesting lettuce and radishes now. The asparagus is producing well. Plant asparagus now from seed and you will have asparagus to harvest in two years or less. It produces faster from seed than from getting the roots to plant.

If you haven't fertilized your roses, rhododendrons or other shrubs it is not too late to do that now. Raspberries, blackberries, strawberries, blueberries and rhubarb will produce better with a good dose of fertilizer too.

The camellias are about finished blooming as are some of the other spring blooming shrubs.

The time to prune flowering shrubs and vines that bloom before the 4th of July is right after they finish blooming. Shrubs and vines that bloom after the 4th of July should be pruned during the dormant season, November thru February.



In the Garden – in May

Fertilize rhododendrons & azaleas with acid-type fertilizer and remove spent blossoms

Place pheromone traps in apple trees to detect coddling moths

Transplant tomatoes & peppers in mid-May

Plant dahlia tubers now

Plant snap & lima beans, Brussels sprouts, cantaloupes, cucumber. dill, eggplant, kale, pumpkins, summer & winter squash, potatoes, and watermelons

Fertilize roses with 1 cu. Alfalfa meal around each rose bush and 1 T fish oil per gallon of water two times this month

Water roses at least once a week
